- ➤ Economic resiliency: the ability of communities and individuals to respond to shocks that may impact economic stability and well-being at the individual, household, business, or market level.
- Societal resiliency: the capacity of societies to cope with many kinds of challenges that impact well-being and is an essential characteristic of what we call "success stories".
- Environmental resiliency: the magnitude of environmental transformation that can be absorbed by communities using key planning infrastructure and policy prior to critical thresholds being surpassed.
- ➤ Governance/legislative resiliency: a community's long-term strategies, plans, and policies the formal and informal mechanisms adopted by governing institutions that highlight the importance of good governance, maintain long-term perspectives, and advance community development, stability, and diversity using an inclusive and transparent approach.



Central research question

How can a realistic role for land use tools towards sustainable development be articulated?

Who are we?

We are a group of interdisciplinary scholars from the University of Alberta developing research on land use tools, governance adaptations and long-term perspectives. As much as we would like to visit all of Alberta's municipalities and communities we are not able to do so, we have therefore designed this survey and with the support of AUMA and RMA hope to reach as many places in Alberta as possible.



Data Acquisition


- 30 questions
- ~1000 surveys sent out (email)
 - Alberta Urban Municipality Association, Rural Municipalities of Alberta, Alberta Development Officers Association
- 106 responses (10.6%)
- 69% completed questions
- Not the sole method of data acquisition follow-up with site (Peace Region, Crowsnest Pass, Flagstaff County (flagstaff united)










Which of these large urban settlements is closest to the community by road?



Context: What is the largest employer in your community?










Past planning:

In the past 10 years, who (individual or organization) played a decisive role in guiding the community's development strategy?




Past Planning:
What used to be the largest employer or industry in the community?






Past Planning:

have changed over the last 30 years






Future Planning:

Take home ideas

- Not fully analyzed
- Oil and gas remain a critical component [at least in perception]
- Significant areas of concern about who or what is driving the development trajectory and identity of a community (e.g. public? Government? Interest groups?)
- The use of long-term strategies more than five years is weak
- Planning and planning departments have an opportunity to become more involved in the development of rural communities across Alberta

- Complete data analysis from the surveys
- Identify a complete list of case study communities
- Develop an interview guide
- Qualitative case communities
 - Four graduate/undergraduate research assistants
 - Interviews will be conducted during Summer 2018 & Fall 2018
 - Thematic data analysis
 - Knowledge mobilization
